

This summer vacation season you may have strolled past Salvador Dali lecturing on screen at The Museum of Modern Art, New York. The video-as-16mm-film-projection was *Chaos and Creation*, 1960. Nearly one-hundred times a day for eleven weeks Dali stood in front of his Piet Mondrian imitation incessantly repeating:

PIET, PIET, PIET.... NIET! DALI, DALI, DALI.... DA!

While it is often cited as the first artist's video, the arguement on which it plays, between pure art and 'corrupted' art, is age old and fruitless. A number of passerby's laughed as Dali performed.
